Bringing Home the Faith

"Cheating in school is an age-old problem, but there is little doubt that technology – cell phones in particular – has made it almost too easy. Studies show that technology has made cheating in school easier, more convenient, and harder to catch than ever before. Cheating typically starts in middle school as a way to rebel against authority. One study found that 66 percent of teens admitted to cheating on exams, and 80 percent said they've let someone copy their homework. Because middle school students no longer have one teacher but several, they think they're less likely to get caught. And teens' parents, while realistic about the frequency of cheating in schools, might need to overcome their own blind spots: More than 75 percent of parents responding to the survey say that cellphone cheating happens at their children's school, but only 3 percent believe their own teen is using a cellphone to cheat."

Our teachers include lessons on proper paraphrasing and how to cite Internet sources to reduce plagiarism. They also develop multiple versions of tests to deter students from sharing answers. They talk with students repeatedly about cheating and there are consequences for their behavior.

As parents, you can help us teach kids how to behave ethically when it comes to homework and their cell phones. "Talk to your kids about the importance of ethical behavior and how cheating will hurt them in the long term. Point out negative examples when you see them and explain the consequences those people will suffer. Explain to your kids that ambition is fine, but honesty and integrity are far more important than academic success achieved through deceit. So let them know that it is not okay to snap a photo of finished homework and share it with others as well as to receive completed homework from others. Read your teens' essays to make sure that they're original. Check the computer history to see if your kids are using Web sites that sell written papers, and confront them if they are. Help manage your teens' schedules so they have time to write papers and prep for exams. Then they won't feel the need to cheat. Finally, stop and ask yourself whether you're putting too much pressure on your children to succeed at school."
